Reporting Agenda: Contract & MOU Financial Performance through July 2022	Since most of June invoices were paid prior to the County fiscal year end on June 30, not much changed in comparison the July update, other than payment of the Abode and El Centro invoices. Contracted service providers are performing as expected and staff project that ~90% of funds will be expended by the end of the year.	
June 2022 Budget & Finance Report	HCH/FH has drawn down over \$1.6M of grant funds in Grant Year 2022 through June 30, 2022, of which approximately \$450K went to personnel, \$26K to office operations and \$1.14M went to service agreements for the delivery of primary medical, dental, enabling and behavioral health services for people experiencing homelessness and farmworkers and their families.	
COVID-19 Supplemental Funding	The HCH/FH program was awarded \$1,631,875 and currently has ~\$800K remaining to dedicate to new projects prior to the award deadline of 3/31/2023. Staff is working with PHPP to increase staff time to support an additional day of Street and Field Medicine each and retrofit an existing van. Additionally, HCH/FH intends to support a mobile laundry service in Pescadero, County Health's effort to purchase a new electronic health record system and is looking for opportunities to support healthcare services at the forthcoming navigation center.

SUBJECT: HCH/FH PROGRAM BUDGET and FINANCIAL REPORT

Preliminary grant expenditures for the month total about \$84,174, putting our year-to-date expenditures at approximately \$2,109,701. This is running slightly less than our planned expenditures for the year. We now project estimated expenditure just about \$2,900,000 in claimable expenditures for the year.

This projection leaves us with right around \$708,000 unexpended funding when compared to our total funds available for the year. This will increase our available unexpended funds at year-end, leaving some additional funding for utilization within our planned spend-down of carryover funds balances.

In general, we will likely expend 95%-97% of our planned contracting budget, which is significantly better than historical years, and aligns with our planning to spend-down carryover funds. However, the unexpected position vacancies during the year will leave us with an additional \$50,000 in salary and benefits savings. This is what is creating the slightly larger unexpended funds balance.

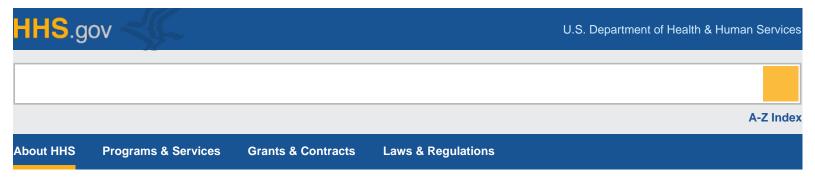

Media Guidelines for HHS Employees	HHS will distribute funding to health centers to support community-based vaccination events and outreach focused on underserved populations							

Today, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), through the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), announced a new \$350 million initiative for HRSA-supported health centers to increase COVID-19 vaccines in their communities, with a specific focus on underserved populations. This funding will support health centers administering updated COVID-19 vaccines through mobile, drive-up, walk-up, or community-based vaccination events, including working with community-based organizations, and other efforts to increase the administration of COVID-19 vaccines.

"Community health centers save lives," said HHS Secretary Xavier Becerra. "We will continue to reach, vaccinate, and protect our most vulnerable people across the country working together with community health centers and community-based organizations. We have seen COVID infections increase in prior winters, and it does not have to be that way this year. We now have updated COVID-19 vaccines to protect communities against the Omicron strain. Our message is simple: Don't wait. Get an updated COVID-19 vaccine this fall. It's safe and effective."

"As community-based organizations that have built deep relationships with their patients and neighborhoods, health centers are uniquely positioned to increase COVID-19 vaccinations," said HRSA Administrator Carole Johnson. "These funds will ensure that people who live in underserved communities have access to updated COVID-19 vaccines this winter through community-based vaccination events hosted by health care providers and organizations they trust."

The Expanding COVID-19 Vaccination initiative will provide resources directly to health centers throughout the country to increase COVID-19 vaccinations this winter by addressing the unique access barriers experienced by the underserved populations that health centers serve. HRSA anticipates these efforts will also increase flu and childhood vaccinations through combined vaccination events. All HRSA-funded health centers, as well as health center look-alikes that received American Rescue Plan funding, will be eligible. These funds build on the previous investments made to HRSA-funded health
